RESOLUTION 110 OF 2022.

BOND ORDINANCE DATED JUNE 7, 2022.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING REPLACEMENT OF A SANITARY SEWER FORCE MAIN CONNECTING THE EAST STRAND STREET PUMP STATION TO THE WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT. IN AND FOR THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$250,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$250,000 BONDS OF SAID CITY TO PAY COSTS THEREOF.

WHEREAS, all requirements under regulations of the State of New York promulgated pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act have been complied with in connection with the project set forth below; and

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all members of said Council, as follows:

Section 1. Replacement of the sanitary sewer force main connecting the East Strand Street pump station to the Waste Water Treatment Plant, including costs incidental thereto, in and for the City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$250,000.

Section 2. The plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of up to \$250,000 bonds of said City hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law; provided, however, that the amount of bonds to be issued shall be reduced to the extent of grants received in connection therewith.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is forty years, pursuant to subdivision 4 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. To the extent not paid from other sources, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said City, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of said City. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said City Comptroller, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters, except as provided herein relating to such bonds herein authorized including date, denominations, maturities, interest payment dates, and whether said bonds shall be repaid in accordance with a schedule providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of such City. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the City Comptroller shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. This ordinance shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 8. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said City is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this Bond Ordinance are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 9. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the City for expenditures made after the effective date of this ordinance for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 10. The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute contracts in furtherance of the purpose set forth herein.

Section 11. This ordinance, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in summary form in The Daily Freeman, the official newspaper of said City hereby designated for such purpose, together with a notice of the City Clerk in substantially the form set forth in paragraph a of Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING REPLACEMENT OF A SANITARY SEWER FORCE MAIN CONNECTING THE EAST STRAND STREET PUMP STATION TO THE WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT. IN AND FOR THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$250,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$250,000 BONDS OF SAID CITY TO PAY COSTS THEREOF.

**WHEREAS**, New York Congressman Tonko has proposed the NY-NJ Watershed Protection Act, a unique federal investment program to authorize \$50 million of federal funds to protect and restore all watersheds, including the Hudson River Watershed, that flow into New York-New Jersey Harbor and

**WHEREAS**, The Act has unanimous support among the Hudson Valley’s Congressional delegation; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Act would provide benefits to diverse stakeholders such as the protection of fisheries and wildlife, conservation of natural resources and public and private lands, critical urban greenspaces, ocean and coastal resources, and various opportunities to improve the quality of life for community members throughout the region; and

**WHEREAS**, Kingston, NY is part of the most densely populated and economically important regions in the country, the proposed NY-NJ Watershed Act will provide enormous economic and environmental benefits locally, regionally and nationally; and

**WHEREAS**, the Act would fund shoreline management and restoration within the watersheds,

**WHEREAS**, as an elected body tasked with protection and safeguarding irreplaceable water-connected resources and nature-based flood hazard mitigation measures that are essential to protect human life and infrastructure; and

**WHEREAS**, this Act would direct the Secretary of the Interior to enhance collaboration and coordinate restoration activities at all levels of government to protect fish and wildlife habitats, endangered species, improve water quality, increase public access to the estuary, mitigate flood risks, and develop public outreach and educational activities; and

**WHEREAS**, many residents of the region of the NY-NJ Watershed live in communities lacking environmental justice, where access to and enjoyment of fish, wildlife, clean natural resources have been impaired or compromised, federal funding is necessary to mitigate these long overdue environmental and social issues; and

**WHEREAS**, Kingston would benefit from the Act as it would establish beneficial programs and award grants to help fund valuable restoration projects in our local community; and

**WHEREAS**, Kingston is a cornerstone in which its residents depend on and the region relies on for its resources to provide prosperity throughout the state, therefore, Kingston must uphold its duty to protect the community’s access to drinking water and natural resources; and

**WHEREAS**, Kingston has an opportunity to be a social and environmental leader of the state, by supporting the NY-NJ Watershed Protection Act, we may lead by example and facilitate much needed change; and

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, the Common Council of the City of Kingston, supports the passing of the NY-NJ Watershed Protection Act.

3. This Memorandum of Agreement shall be without precedent except to enforce its specific terms and shall not constitute a past practice and is subject to ratification by the City.



After our discussions with Corporation Counsel, I would like the Laws & Rules committee to consider passing a resolution to start a 'Focus Group' or 'Taskforce' for the recent passage of the Marijuana Regulation and Taxation Act (MRTA). This group would be made up of citizens selected through an application process and selected by the Common Council and the mayor; however, it would not be an advisory board as defined in our City Charter, nor would it be a decision-making body. The group's purpose would be to help the city to proactively address issues that may arise from the passage of the MRTA in a fair and equitable way. The Laws & Rules committee should consider how many members, how many appointed by council and how many appointed by the mayor, and the terms of membership, as well as anything else the committee and/or Corporation Counsel deems necessary.

AUTHORIZING THE ADOPTION OF A NEW CHAPTER 87 OF THE CODE OF  
THE CITY OF KINGSTON ENTITLED “OPEN MEETING PARTICIPATION”**

**WHEREAS**, amendments to the Open Meetings Law (Ch. 56 of the Laws of 2022) went into effect on April 9, 2022; and

**WHEREAS**, the aforementioned amendments require each city that wishes to allow for remote attendance by its members of public bodies at locations that do not allow for in-person physical attendance by the public to adopt a local law authorizing such remote attendance and establishing written procedures therefore;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AS FOLLOWS:**

**SECTION 1.** That the Common Council authorizes the amendment of Chapter 87 of the Administrative Code of the City of Kingston as annexed hereto.

**SECTION 2.** If any provisions of this local law are held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of the local law shall remain in effect.

**SECTION 3.** This local law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State.

Description: In response to Open Meetings Law Changes (Ch. 56 of the Laws of 2022) signed by Gov. Hochul on April 9, 2022, the Common Council adopts a Local Law, as annexed hereto, to authorize and specify procedures for remote meeting attendance, via videoconference, under "extraordinary circumstances." Such circumstances shall include, but not be limited to, a participant's disability, illness, caregiving obligations, or any other significant or unexpected factor or event that precludes the member's in-person attendance at the scheduled meeting. Any persons seeking to participate remotely under this provision must receive approval from the meeting Chair before the start of the meeting and, as a precondition to that approval, shall identify the nature of the extraordinary circumstance. The Chair may not count any remote participants toward a quorum unless the participant's remote location has been identified in the public notice for the meeting and that location is open to members of the public. Other individuals participating remotely may attend and vote at meetings so long as a quorum has been convened in accordance with Public Officers Law § 103-a.




